# "How long should I age this wine?"

This is a regularly posed question here at Jaffurs, and one that can be a little tricky to answer. Our wines have a great track record of aging gracefully, and developing over time, but are also made in a style that usually won't necessitate additional bottle age before they are approachable.

While the Santa Barbara County Syrah, Grenache, and other wines can do very well with time in bottle, it is our vineyard designate and Upslope Syrahs that are generally produced with aging potential in mind. Extended time in barrel, use of "whole-cluster" fermentation, and a little new oak on these wines impart additional structure that will integrate over time and allow the subtleties in flavor to fully shine.

If you prefer powerful, fruitful wines with grippy tannins, our Syrahs provide these characteristics in spades early on. You'll be very happy drinking them on release and within the first five or so years of the vintage. Past ten years, the wines are often exceptional, but factors such as bottle variation and vintage conditions become more apparent. If you're looking to strike that balance between nuance and exuberance, I usually recommend five to eight years past the vintage. Here, our Reserve Syrahs consistently show energy in the fruit, with underlying savory nuance and softening structure. # TWO TIMES TOMATO BRUSCHETTA


This recipe is simple but always a hit. Sun-dried tomatoes add a fun texture. It can easily be doubled if serving to guests. Similarly to wine in barrels, time is helpful. After preparing, give the dish time to sit in the refrigerator before serving. The flavors will expand and you'll be delighted! — Marrissa Schoonover

## **INGREDIENTS**

- 6 Roma tomatoes, scraped out seeds and pulp and chopped
- ½ cup sun-dried tomatoes, chopped (if using sun-dried tomatoes packed in oil, pull back a bit on olive oil for mixing)
- 3 cloves minced garlic
- <sup>1</sup>/<sub>4</sub> cup good olive oil
- <sup>1</sup>/<sub>4</sub> cup of basil, ribboned
- 2 tbsp good balsamic vinegar
- <sup>1</sup>/<sub>4</sub> tsp salt and pepper

## **INSTRUCTIONS**

Combine ingredients in a bowl and stir gently to coat. Wait at least an hour before serving. Slice baguette, brush with olive oil and toast. Spoon tomatoes on top of baguette and finish with a grate of parmesan. Make sure to pour yourself some Grenache!

## 2018 Grenache, Santa Barbara County

(1 bottle Anthology Club)

#### Vinous 92 points

Crushed rose petal, cedar, sweet pipe tobacco and mint soar out of the glass as the 2018 Grenache shows off its considerable allure. Soft and inviting, with tons of varietal character and appeal, the Grenache simply hits all the right notes. Drinking window 2020-2028. — Antonio Galloni

## 2017 Syrah, Thompson Vineyard

#### (1 bottle Anthology Club; 3 bottles Reserve Syrah Club)

#### Jeb Dunnuck 92 points

The 2017 Syrah Thompson Vineyard comes from a great site in Santa Barbara County and was all destemmed. It gives up a ripe, sexy bouquet of red and blue fruits, ground pepper, and violets, with just a touch of gaminess and bacon fat emerging with time in the glass. Nicely textured, medium to full-bodied, and concentrated, it's a ripe, powerful California Syrah to drink over the coming 7-8 years. — Jeb Dunnuck

## **SECOND QUARTER**

### 2017 High Tide, Santa Barbara County (1 bottle Anthology Club)

#### Jeb Dunnuck 92 points

The 2017 High Tide Santa Barbara County checks in as close to equal parts Grenache, Syrah, and Mourvèdre that saw plenty of stems and 18 months in 17% new French oak. This meaty, spicy blend offers a deep purple hue, notes of spiced blackberries, crushed violets, and peppery spice, medium-bodied richness, ripe tannins, and a well-balanced, concentrated style that's going to evolve nicely for 7-8 years or more. Maturity 2020-2028. — Jeb Dunnuck

#### 2018 Pinot Noir, Santa Barbara County (1 bottle Anthology Club)

#### Jeb Dunnuck 90 points

The 2018 Pinot Noir Santa Barbara County comes from the Duvarita and Fiddlestix vineyards and was 50% destemmed and aged in 14% new French oak. Deeper ruby/plum-hued with lots of darker fruits, leafy herbs, smoked earth, and peppery notes, it's medium-bodied, has a supple, elegant texture, present tannins, and a good finish. I think it will be even better this time next year and should drink nicely for 4-5 years. — Jeb Dunnuck

## 2017 Syrah, Larner Vineyard

(1 bottle Anthology Club; 3 bottles Reserve Syrah Club)

#### Vinous 94 points

The 2017 Syrah Larner Vineyard is a deeply intriguing, beautiful wine. Dark red fruit, mint, iron and incense form a compelling profile. The 2017 is a potent, intense wine, and yet it expresses that sense of energy that is such a signature of Larner and Ballard Canyon. Savory overtones and a spine of tannin take this gorgeous Syrah through to the finish. Impressive. Drinking window 2022-2032. — Antonio Galloni
